
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INTRODUCTION

This Activity Report outlines the activities carried out by the Spanish Network of Cities for Climate (RECC) in the last two quarters of 2021, in accordance with the work plan set out in the Resolution on the grant provided under Article 22.2.C) of the General Subsidies Law between the Ministry for the Ecological Transition and the Demographic Challenge and the Spanish Federation of Municipalities and Provinces, to promote and facilitate the development of local actions on climate change.



GENERAL ASSEMBLY

The **14th General Assembly of the Network of Cities for Climate** was held online on 12 July 2021. It was attended by approximately 100 local government representatives, high public servants, and politicians, who discussed the work carried out in 2021 and the Network's lines of action for 2022.

Low-emission Zones, Local Energy Communities, urban regeneration, and improving energy efficiency of existing buildings were just some of the areas earmarked for work in the future.



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TECHNICAL PROJECTS

Calculating and Recording Cities' Carbon Footprints

The Spanish Network of Cities for Climate has been supporting members in the calculation and recording of their carbon footprints since 2014 so that they can determine the amount of greenhouse gas emissions they produce, and hence, take action to reduce them.

This project aims to register new local governments in the Carbon footprint Register created under Royal Decree 163/2014. Furthermore, it is considered an essential starting point to enable local governments to further the decarbonisation of their activities.

During the period, the carbon footprints of at least 40 new entities were calculated, and more than 50 local bodies expressed an interest in participating in the initiative. This year also saw several local governments calculate their carbon footprints for the fourth consecutive year, and at least two local entities were awarded the 'Footprint Reduction Seal'.

Carbon Sequestration Projects

The project focused on identifying and developing carbon sequestration projects by those local entities that met the Register requirements.

A mapping of projects at the national level was carried out to identify projects, completed or under completion, that met the criteria and characteristics to be registered under the controlling authority.

With the collaboration of participating local governments, a forestry management plan has been developed to successfully implement the project and to correctly estimate carbon sequestration.

Carbon Footprint Calculation and Carbon Sequestration Project Training

The local governments technical staff of the Spanish Network of Cities for Climate received training on how to calculate and subsequently record their carbon footprints, and on the implementation of carbon sequestration projects. The content was designed to provide essential training on how to independently carry out these tasks.

The training was provided online, and it allowed access to theoretical content and practical exercises, as well as fluent communication between trainers and participants. The content was structured into two modules, which began with a two-hour webinar.

The webinars were held on 22 and 29 November (Module I on Carbon Footprint Calculation) and on 13 and 20 December 2021 (Module II on Carbon Sequestration Projects). A total of 80 people attended the webinars.

The training contents were as it follows:

- Module I: Carbon Footprint
 - Theoretical concepts, types of footprints, municipal footprint
 - Registration with the Spanish Office for Climate Change (OECC)

Module II: Sequestration Projects

- What are carbon sinks? methodologies for estimating carbon sinks, carbon sinks in cities
- Registration at the OECC

Creation of a pilot project to be developed by members of the Spanish Network of Cities for Climate

The pilot project intended was undernamed 'Adaptation of schools to climate change' and aimed to provide local entities of the Network with the means to implement actions to adapt their schools to climate change, including awareness-raising workshops and staff training. Actions must be taken in all areas.

The project involves action in the following areas:

- Energetic efficiency improvement, ventilation, and health conditions in educational buildings.
- Comfort improvement, climate adaptation of playgrounds, outdoor spaces, and surrounding areas.
- Sustainable mobility and school transport.
- · Healthy diet and food waste reduction.
- Sustainable practices by educational staff (teaching staff and students).

A guide with recommendations and technical proposals for each of the areas has been prepared and it will be piloted in ten schools in participating Network cities.

WEBINARS

The webinars addressed the proposals put forward at the 14th General Assembly of the Network and discussed the most relevant aspects of climate change mitigation and adaptation.

Eventually, four workshops were organised and, due to the health situation, it was decided to hold them online. They registered high participation rates, with well over a hundred people attending each workshop.

Videos of the workshops, and the presentations submitted by the speakers are available on the website of the Spanish Network of Cities for Climate. In addition, leaflets have been produced to provide a summary of the most important information addressed at the workshops.



Presentation of the creation of Low-Emission Zones guidelines

An event was held on November the 19th to launch the Creation of Low-Emission Zones Guidelines, a document drawn up by the Ministry for the Ecological Transition and the Demographic Challenge (MITECO) in collaboration with the Spanish Federation of Municipalities and Provinces (FEMP).

This event was opened by the FEMP General Secretary, Carlos Daniel Casares, the MITECO Deputy Minister for the Environment, Hugo Morán, and the Environment, Oceans and Fisheries European Commissioner, Virginijus Sinkevicius.

The event highlight was a round table moderated by the MITECO Clean Air Coordinator, María José Alonso. Alfonso Gil, Bilbao Deputy Mayor and Chairman of the FEMP's Transport, Sustainable Mobility and Road Safety Commission; José Miguel Luengo Gallego, San Javier Mayor and Chairman of FEMP's Environment Committee; Ismael Aznar, MITECO Environmental Quality and Assessment General Director, and Ángeles Marín, Ministry of Transport, Mobility and Urban Agenda (MITMA) Mobility Strategy Office Director took part on it.

They all supported the establishment of Low-Emission Zones, the promotion of means to create healthier and safer cities, the importance of securing public support and of raising environmental awareness among citizens.

The advent of a new mobility alternative which is more environmentally friendly and safer for pedestrians, and other mobility modes such as scooters and bicycles, etc., have required a move towards a new and more sustainable model in which Low-Emission Zones will play a pivotal role. This was highlighted in the Guidelines for the Creation of Low-emission Zones document presented, and which can be consulted on the website of the FEMP. The document is a collaboration between the FEMP and the Ministry for the Ecological Transition and the Demographic Challenge.



Location of renewable energy generation

An online Panel was held on 2 December to discuss the location for renewable energy generation.

The objectives of the Panel, which was attended by around 90 local government representatives, were as it follows:

- To describe and to analyse the situation.
- To reflect on the impact of implementing energy production from renewable sources.
- To discuss how to transfer the energy transition to the territory while minimising potential adverse effects and ensuring the sustainability of the process.
- To put forward recommendations for the location: make monitoring tools available to local governments.
- Establish guidelines for a successful energy transition that benefits everyone while minimising undesirable effects.

The Panel was attended by representatives of the three authorities:

Regulation of Local Energy Communities

A webinar on Local Energy Communities was held on 9 December and attended by more than a hundred people.

Joan Herrera, Environmental and Energy Action Director of El Prat de Llobregat City Council, explained the current legal framework for the establishment of Local Energy Communities, and Jorge Andrey, stepping in for Pilar Navarro, Economic Recovery and Business Parks General Director of Seville City Council, presented a proposal for the regulation of this energy instrument.

PRTR Funds and their importance for local entities in the fight against climate change

The last webinar scheduled was held on 16 December and was attended by approximately 75 municipal officials and elected representatives.

The local government role in the Recovery, Transformation and Resilience Plan (PRTR) was explained by Santiago Fernández Muñoz, Head of Unit for the Monitoring of the PRTR of the President of the Government Office.

This was followed by a round table where participants from various ministries analysed local action plans and programmes in connection with the PRTR:

Good practices on climate change awards presentation

The 8th Edition of the Local Good Practices on Climate Change Awards ceremony was held on 12 May 2021 and attended by the prize-winners.

The ceremony was hosted by the FEMP General Secretary, Carlos Daniel Casares, and the Spanish Office for Climate Change General Director, Valvanera Ulargui.

Due to the health crisis, however, only the persons designated to collect the award on behalf of the local entity were able to follow the event into the FEMP building, while the others followed it online.

4 MEETINGS AND SEMINARS

Network and FEMP representatives took part in the following meetings and events about climate change:

Climate change adaptation at local level. Online, 18 and 20 May 2021.
The aim of this training course, organised in the context of the LifeShara project, was to facilitate the integration of climate change into municipal planning and to provide useful and practical resources for adaptation to climate change. The course was attended by representatives of the Biodiversity Foundation, the OECC, MITMA and RECC.



• The challenge of climate neutrality for Spanish cities. Presentation of cities 2030. Senate Palace, September the 8th 2021.

The FEMP Chairman participated online in this event organised by the Ministry for the Ecological Transition and the Demographic Challenge to share the initiatives, difficulties, and experiences of different cities in addressing the challenges of moving towards urban sustainability and climate neutrality..

• Energy Communities: citizen engagement in the energy transition, organised by the Institute for the Diversification and Saving of Energy (IDAE) in Crevillent (Alicante) on 16 September 2021. The conference was attended by the Third Deputy Prime Minister and Minister for the Ecological Transition and the Demographic Challenge, Teresa Ribera; the Secretary of State for Energy, Sara Aagesen, and the Director General of IDAE, Joan Groizard. The new aid programmes launched by the government for Local Energy Communities as part of the Recovery, Transformation and Resilience Plan were presented at the event.

Robert Raga Gadea, Mayor of Riba-roja de Turia and a member of the Governing Council of the Spanish Network of Cities for Climate attended this on-site event on behalf of the Network.

- Urban Forum of Spain: City Networks Round Table, Seville, 7 October 2021. As part of the Urban Forum of Spain, a round table entitled 'Cities and Territories' role in Social and Economic Recovery' was organised by UN-Habitat, the Ministry of Transport, Mobility and Urban Agenda and Seville City Council. It was attended by Robert Raga Gadea, Mayor of Riba-roja de Turia and a member of the Steering Committee of the Spanish Network of Cities for Climate, on behalf of the latter.
- Course on Municipal Plans for the Fight Against Climate Change, organised by the Jaen Provincial Council on 26 October 2021. The course was attended by the technical representative of the Network, Pilar Muñoz, Head of SDGs, Partnerships and Projects in the Provincial Council of Badajoz.

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DOCUMENTS

To expand the reach of the workshops carried out, leaflets summarising their main contents and conclusions have been published.

Presentation of recommendations for the creation of LEZ

The leaflet contains the key points covered by the various panellists on the need to establish Low-emission Zones in cities with more than 50,000 inhabitants by 2023, as well as some of the recommendations for the creation of LEZs set out in the document prepared by the MITECO in collaboration with the FEMP.

Location of Renewable Energy Generation

This document outlines local, regional, and national projects and experiences in the development of renewable energy projects with the aim of reforming our energy system and meeting the climate neutrality targets set by European and Spanish policy.

PRTR Funds and their importance for local entities in the fight against climate change

After a brief presentation on the Recovery, Transformation and Resilience Plan, the impact of the various Plan initiatives and programmes in the fight against climate change were analysed in detail.

In addition, the following audio-visual resources were produced:

A video on the Recovery, Transformation and Resilience Plan (PRTR), to provide local entities of the Network with a communication tool to acquaint representatives of local government and municipal officials with the content of the Plan and, more specifically, with the PRTR Components and objectives that have a more direct impact on municipal policy aimed at mitigating and adapting to climate change, namely:

- Component 1: Urban rehabilitation and regeneration plan
- Component 2: Urban rehabilitation and regeneration plan
- Component 4: Ecosystems and biodiversity conservation and restoration
- Component 5: Coast and water resources preservation
- Component 7: Renewable energy sources deployment and integration

The video also covers the various projects that could be carried out in response to calls for proposals under the Plan.

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Production of a video on renewable energy and generation for self-consumption to provide the Network local entities with a communication tool to inform the public of the need to use renewable energies and encourage self-consumption to meet national and international commitments (Recovery Plan for Europe, Paris Agreement, 2030 Agenda, Urban Agenda, National Energy and Climate Plan, etc.).

Production of a video about Low-Emission Zones to provide local entities of the Network with a communication tool to inform the public of the benefits of LEZs, the obligation to implement them in certain cities and the importance of their cooperation for the effective operation of these zones.

The video is intended to support municipal authorities in raising public awareness of the need to implement LEZs and highlights their benefits for the public. It will also serve to inform citizens of the obligation to establish these zones in certain cities under the current law and provides answers to the most common questions municipal authorities have in relation to the establishment of Low-Emission Zones.

The website is regularly updated with reports and documents released by the Network, and with information and news forwarded to the Network Secretariat by the members.


To promote the activities of the Network and its members more widely, a brief newsletter is published every month and sent to all Spanish Network of Cities for Climate representatives and other stakeholders.
